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Pumpkin Patch 2015 October 5-31

It’s pumpkin time again! And while those bright orange squash help you feel more like fall and liven up your front stoop, they do so much more.

First, all profits from the pumpkin sales benefit Youth Missions. For the past four years, members of our youth group and a handful of adult volunteers have been participating in the *Pura Vida* project in San Ramon, Costa Rica. If you were in church when the youth provided their report this summer, you saw the intense impact it had on so many of them. They spend a week in Costa Rica helping others, yet it makes a deep difference in their lives as well. And just think... you can help with this legacy simply buying a pumpkin or manning the pumpkin patch for a two-hour shift.

Second, did you ever wonder why it seems United Methodist Churches are the ones with pumpkin patches? Working with Navajos in New Mexico, pumpkins are harvested and trucked to churches around the country. Over \$1.3 million dollars in harvest labor makes a significant difference in the quality of lives of the Navajos living on the reservation where the rate of unemployment is 42%. For many, it’s the only opportunity to provide for their families. In addition, Pueblo, Zuni, and Hopi Native Americans are hired to help with harvest.

During the harvest time, workers are provided with transportation so they can come to the harvest. They are housed in dorms with laundry facilities, provided with extensive safety orientation, and fed meals.

And third, through the Pumpkin Patch program, thousands of school children, senior citizen centers, special education & handicapped facilities, behavioral health facilities, church organizations, government services, correctional youth services, and civic groups receive free pumpkins for their causes.

Who knew you were doing so much with that jack-o-lantern?

We hope to see you as a customer and volunteer in the Pumpkin Patch. Please consider signing up for a two-hour shift. The sign-up board is available in the Courtyard during Sunday services and in the Church Ministries Office throughout the week. You can also call 386-428-6252 or sign up online at CoronadoUMC.org. A Variety of Books Worth Reading


I don't know how many of you are avid readers but if you are, I wanted to share some book titles for you that don't make the Best Seller Lists. There is quite a variety here. Some of these would be great for leadership and others perfect for small group discussions. Some you may have already heard about and some are very recently published. I have lots more books queued up on my reading list so expect to get another list in the future. I would also welcome recommendations from you to add to my list.

Like all books I don't expect you to agree with everything (I don't always either) but know that the shared knowledge becomes an advanced starting ground for our conversations and helps us apply this knowledge to our particular church (or personal) situation.

I will look for some funds to help get a few of each of these for our church library so that we can share and encourage each other without too much expense.

- * ***Simple Church*** by Eric Geiger and Thom Rainer. A statistical look at thriving churches and some of the common habits that help them thrive.
- * ***Conspiracy of Kindness*** by Steve Sjogren. A different kind of evangelism – called servant evangelism for those of us who find it more difficult to start the conversation with friends and strangers.
- * ***Bearing Fruit: Ministry with Real Results*** by Lovett Weems. This book reminds us to aim for the right goals and measure our success based on real results.
- * ***Mere Christianity*** by CS Lewis. The broad view of Christian theology trying to show the common ground of the entire Christian tradition.
- * ***Love Wins: A Book About Heaven, Hell and the Fate of Every Person Who Ever Lived*** by Rob Bell. A compelling look at scripture verses and the original words used to better understand the biblical witness on Heaven and Hell.
- * ***Toxic Charity: How the Church Hurts Those They Help and How to Reverse It*** by Robert Lupton. What a jolt! A wake up call to those serving others in missions. What helps and what hurts and how to lean into the best options.
- * ***Waking to God's Dream*** by Bishop Dick Wills. This book shows the power of small group ministry in the local church.
- * ***The Secret Message of Jesus*** by Brian McLaren. A great reminder of the original message of Jesus without the 21st Century, Western filters on the message.

A Christian Perspective

The Koinonia mission statement: *We are Christians called to live together in intentional community sharing a life of prayer, work, study, service and fellowship. We seek to embody peacemaking, sustainability, and radical sharing. While honoring people of all backgrounds and faiths, we strive to demonstrate the way of Jesus as an alternative to materialism, militarism and racism.*

Koinonia Farm was established in 1942. Their community life is based on the teachings and principles of Jesus, following the example of the first Christian communities as described in the Acts of the Apostles. Koinonia developed a housing ministry that evolved into what is now Habitat for Humanity International.

The Koinonians have developed a mission in connection with the nearby Stewart Detention Center which houses approximately 2,000 male residents who are being processed for deportation to their respective nations. Since the Stewart Detention Center was originally built as a maximum security prison, the deportees often have to return with only prison-issued garments to wear. The Koinonia ministry tries to give each deportee a personalized duffel bag according to the regulations of ICE (Immigrations and Customs Enforcement).


The soon-to-be-deported are only allowed to be provided with:

- ◆ 1 bag with zipper, no larger than 22" x 14" x 9" (backpack, duffel bag, carry-on size)
- ◆ 1 pair of shoes (preference size 6 - 10)
- ◆ 3 pairs of pants (preference 28 - 32 waist)
- ◆ 3 pairs of socks
- ◆ 3 shirts (preference M, L)
- ◆ 3 undershirts (preference M, L)
- ◆ 3 pairs underwear
- ◆ 1 coat

If anyone is interested in a 5-day mission trip, November 11 - 15, to deliver donations and to experience several days in an intentional Christian community, please contact Janet Bernhard, UMW Social Action Chairperson, at jbernhard@cfl.rr.com or by phone at 386-847-3807.

If you are unable to travel, but would like to make a donation to this ministry, consider filling a bag or backpack with packages of new underwear, socks and undershirts.

These men will return to their nations with the memory that a Christian community showed kindness and afforded them some measure of dignity at a very difficult and sad time.

- * ***Eager to Love: The Alternative Way of Francis and Clare*** by Richard Rohr. Trust me. Just finished it. A wonderful book to read. Learn some more theology, a bit of history and understand these amazing people a bit better.
- * ***Blessed are the Crazy*** by Sarah Griffith Lund. Some of you have read this one already. I found it theologically sound and inspirational to engage in ministry deeper here at CCUMC.
- * ***Did God Kill Jesus? Searching for Love in History's Most Famous Execution*** by Tony Jones. This book tackles Atonement theology specifically. Lots of pondering ahead.

Want to Continue Volunteering at the Marine Discovery Center?



The SundayServe team constructed 204 bags returning about 6,000 pounds of oysters to the Indian River lagoon. The oyster shells were shoveled into 30-pound net bags. These shells will be placed in spots where oyster beds have been lost due to wave action from boats and over-harvesting. The calcium carbonate within the shells will attract spat (microscopic baby oysters). These oysters will attach to the shells and hopefully grow new, healthy, oyster reefs. Each restored oyster improves the health of the entire lagoon ecosystem as it can filter over 50 gallons of water per day.

The team also placed a demonstration area at the MDC wetland marsh showing the effectiveness of oyster mats. Each mat contains 36 shells and will provide a new home for 93 baby oysters.


