## Mental Illness and Families of Faith: How Our Congregation Can Respond

Last spring, we held a small-group that focused on mental illness, utilizing the book, *Blessed Are the Crazy* by the Rev. Sarah Griffith Lund. Based on the group's concern for ongoing discussion regarding Rev. Lund's challenge to faith communities to minister to and with those with a mental illness and their families, our Congregational Care Ministry began the task of bringing about awareness of mental illness through education, support groups, and helpful resources available to us through NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) and Mental Health Ministries.

It is our vision to make our faith community a vessel of hope for persons with a mental illness and their families using a five step approach for faith communities created by Mental Health Ministries: education, commitment, welcome, support, and advocacy. While we recognize that we cannot "fix" persons with mental illness or their families, we can offer compassionate support, hope, and unconditional love.

The Rev. Susan Gregg-Schroeder, Coordinator of Mental Health Ministries and author of *In The Shadow of God's Wings: Grace in the Midst of Depression*, writes, "As a United Methodist Minister and a person who has struggled with depression, I started Mental Health Ministries with a vision of producing high quality resources to reduce the stigma of mental illness in our faith communities. I experienced firsthand the reluctance of our faith communities to talk about or to minister to persons with a mental illness and their families. Too often mental illness is thought of as a moral or spiritual failure rather than a treatable illness. Many persons with a mental health issue will go first to their clergy or faith leader. But studies show that many clergy are not effective in providing the support and referrals that individuals and their families need. Helping faith communities become caring congregations is my passion. The response I receive from groups using our resources to educate about mental illness is overwhelming.

# Message from Peter

Peter Cottrell, Senior Pastor




We continue to be so grateful to be part of this amazing church community. This church has opportunities and ministries that so many other churches dream of doing. Almost every week I discover something else that “we” do to build the Kingdom of God, and usually it is shared in that “no big deal” way. This is an amazing church. We are in wonderful missions. We are blessed to have the staff we do. It is a joy to work along side our church leadership. I am also thankful for the most wonderful wife and our family (a grandchild is so much fun!).

I am eager to meet the rest of the church family as they come south to Florida to winter. I hope all of you will continue to wear your name tags so that I can keep learning names. Some days I can remember a lot, and other days I feel like I can't remember my own name. I know it is important so I continue to seek opportunities to get to know you all (not just your names).

For a few weeks during November, Carla and I will be on the Cruise with Bishop Ken Carter, his wife Pam and with Dr. Waite Willis (who was one of my professors at Florida Southern College and who is now the head of the Religion Department there), with a number of other clergy from Florida and some members of our congregation. I know it will be a rewarding spiritual pilgrimage for me and look forward to gaining new insights into the missionary work and, therefore, the writings of Paul. Laura will be preaching while I am away, and I am excited that you will get to hear her reflections on *Seeing the Face of God* in a few of the stories of Jesus.

One last thing . . . if you have any burning issues or questions or ideas about something that you would like to see as a sermon series then send me an email at [peter.cottrell@coronadoumc.org](mailto:peter.cottrell@coronadoumc.org); and we will take it into consideration as we make plans for the months ahead.

This year for Advent (the season of preparation for the birth of Christ) we will be using a devotional book and offering a study based on *God Is in the Manger: Reflections on Advent and Christmas* based on the writings of Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Bonhoeffer lived a short but powerful life from 1906 to 1945. He came from a well-to-do family, studied theology, and became one of the most beloved theologians of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. He loved Germany but for years stood up to Adolf Hitler and the Nazis. He was arrested in 1943 and spent two years in prison. As the Third Reich crumbled in 1945, Hitler ordered the execution of some political prisoners who had conspired to overthrow him. Bonhoeffer was hanged on April 8, 1945, just 10 days before German forces began to surrender. It is my prayer that as many as are able will join us in this time of spiritual preparation. 



## A Christian Perspective

Janet Bernhard, UMW Social Justice



The Koinonia mission statement: *We are Christians called to live together in intentional community sharing a life of prayer, work, study, service and fellowship. We seek to embody peacemaking, sustainability, and radical sharing. While honoring people of all backgrounds and faiths, we strive to demonstrate the way of Jesus as an alternative to materialism, militarism and racism.*

Koinonia Farm was established in 1942. Their community life is based on the teachings and principles of Jesus, following the example of the first Christian communities as described in the Acts of the Apostles. Koinonia developed a housing ministry that evolved into what is now Habitat for Humanity International.

The Koinonians have developed a mission in connection with the nearby Stewart Detention Center which houses approximately 2,000 male residents who are being processed for deportation to their respective nations. Since the Stewart Detention Center was originally built as a maximum security prison, the deportees often have to return with only prison-issued garments to wear. The Koinonia ministry tries to give each deportee a personalized duffel bag according to the regulations of ICE (Immigrations and Customs Enforcement).

The soon-to-be-deported are only allowed to be provided with:

- ◆ 1 bag with zipper, no larger than 22" x 14" x 9" (backpack, duffel bag, carry-on size)
- ◆ 1 pair of shoes (preference size 6 - 10)
- ◆ 3 pairs of pants (preference 28 - 32 waist)
- ◆ 3 pairs of socks
- ◆ 3 shirts (preference M, L)
- ◆ 3 undershirts (preference M, L)
- ◆ 3 pairs underwear
- ◆ 1 coat

These men will return to their nations with the memory that a Christian community showed kindness and afforded them some measure of dignity at a very difficult and sad time.

On Monday, October 26, we had a great crowd at the Community Action Assembly representing 32 faith communities in Volusia County. Pastor Peter Cottrell delivered a powerful meditation on Micah 6:8. Anna Paulis and Ron Smith of Coronado participated in the program, and our own Betty Weber was elected an At-Large Member of the Board of F.A.I.T.H. Thanks to all of you from Coronado who attended and helped us host this event.

The purpose of the meeting was to choose the issue on which F.A.I.T.H. will concentrate its efforts to bring about change in 2016. After hearing four testimonies on behalf of the issues arising from the House Meetings (education, healthcare, housing/homelessness, and criminal justice), the group voted for Healthcare. Research groups will begin working next month on how we can best address this need and proposals we can bring to the Action Assembly in the spring. 

**Why learn Hands Only CPR?** Cardiac arrest, an electrical malfunction in the heart that causes an irregular heart-beat (arrhythmia) and disrupts the flow of blood to the brain, lungs and other organs, is a leading cause of death. Each year, over 326,000 out-of-hospital arrests occur in the United States.



- When a person has a cardiac arrest, survival depends on immediately getting CPR from someone nearby
- According to the American Heart Association 90% of people who suffer out-of-hospital cardiac arrests die. CPR, especially if performed immediately, can double or triple a cardiac arrest victim's chance of survival.

Most Americans (70%) feel helpless to act during a cardiac emergency because they don't know how to administer CPR, or they're afraid of hurting the victim.

This short program, including a 20-minute DVD and practice on a "mini-anne" mannequin, will be extremely beneficial to all of us. This does not provide certification in CPR, but is meant for the general public. I will have the kit available for anyone to use at any time if you are unable to attend, want to watch it again, for individuals or small groups, such as Sunday School classes, circles, families.
