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Lent

Lent is a very important season for the church and particularly meaningful for me. The season begins on Ash Wednesday, and the aim of the season is set at that service. We will gather together and begin the journey of preparation. The ashes will remind us that the journey is not about us or about our egos, but about preparing for Holy Week and Easter. Holy Week is the last week of Lent and kicks off with Palm Sunday and ends on Easter Sunday.

Lent is 40 days (the length of a number of different preparations in scripture) and does not include any Sunday during the season. Sundays are set aside as weekly anniversaries of Easter, so the daily sacrifice does not align with that day. During Lent, we are invited to give up something. It is intended for us to have a daily reminder of the sacrifice that Jesus makes for us on Good Friday. It is not intended to be a second chance at a New Year's resolution. Traditionally, people would clean out the pantry of butter and sugar (hence Shrove Tuesday pancakes). I hope you will consider what might be a meaningful way for you to connect to Jesus' sacrifice by giving something up or adding some sort of sacrificial service to your daily life.

I would also like to encourage you to engage in daily bible readings during Lent. There are 89 chapters, total, in the four gospels; so if you are willing to read a bit more than 2 chapters per day, you can read all four of the gospels during Lent.

The sermon series throughout Lent will be based on the book *The 24 Hours that Changed the World* by Adam Hamilton. A small group discussion study will meet weekly on Thursdays at 6 p.m. We will have a number of special services to enhance our season: Ash Wednesday, February 10, at 6:30 p.m. (with ashes and communion); Maundy Thursday (the Thursday of Holy week and the service when we celebrate the Last Supper); March 24, 7 p.m. will be a Tenebrae Service; and Good Friday, March 25, 7 p.m., will be a short service. Then on Easter morning . . . well you know what happens then.

I find that the more intentional I am during Lent, the more meaningful the season is. I pray that we will all have an intentional, meaningful and holy Lent.



Lent during February

Shrove Tuesday, February 9:

Pancake Dinner, 5 p.m.

Shrove Tuesday (or *Mardi Gras*) occurs the first Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. It officially ends the season of **Epiphany** and is the vigil for the starting of Lent. Traditionally viewed as a day of repentance, Shrove Tuesday has become the last day for celebration and feasting before the period of fasting required during the Lenten season. The name "Shrove Tuesday" is derived from the word "shrive", which means to confess and receive absolution. The name denotes a period of cleansing, wherein a person brings their lusts and appetites under subjection through abstention and self-sacrifice. Shrove Tuesday originated during the Middle Ages. Food items like meats, fats, eggs, milk, and fish were regarded as restricted during Lent. To keep such food from being wasted, many families would have big feasts on Shrove Tuesday in order to consume those items that would inevitably become spoiled during the next forty days. The English tradition of eating pancakes on Shrove

Tuesday came about as a way to use as much milk, fats, and eggs as possible before Ash Wednesday began. In France, the consumption of all fats and fatty foods on this day coined the name "Fat Tuesday" or *Mardi Gras*.

Service with Communion, 5:30 p.m.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent and derives its name from the practice of blessing ashes and placing them on the foreheads of participants. Ash Wednesday emphasizes two themes: our sinfulness before God and our human mortality. The service focuses on both themes, helping us to realize that both have been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.



24 Hours That Changed the World


In the season of Lent, the church focuses on remembering, retelling and participating in the story of the suffering and death of Jesus Christ. Lent, the period of 40 days before Easter (excluding Sundays), begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Saturday, the evening before Easter.

During Lent, we enter into a season of preparation, self-reflection and repentance when we seek to literally “turn around” and realign our lives and focus toward God. It is a time to give up things as well as take on new life-giving practices, helping us rid ourselves of distractions and our own selfish desires. By doing so, we seek to live and love as more faithful disciples of Jesus Christ.

This year for Lent, Pastor Peter will be preaching a series of sermons on the last 24 hours of Jesus’ life. We will use a book and offer a six-week study based on Peter’s sermon series and Rev. Adam Hamilton’s book, *24 Hours That Changed the World*. In this Lenten journey, Hamilton guides us through the last 24 hours of Jesus’ life, helping us experience and understand the significance of Jesus’ suffering and death like never before. Classes will be held on **Thursday nights, February 11-March 17, in our Music-Lecture Suite from 6-7:30 p.m.** Refreshments will be provided. Thanks to our Chancel Choir with orchestra for getting our Concert Season off to a great start with the December 6, presentation of *The Many Moods of Christmas Suite II*, arranged by Robert Shaw and Robert Russell Bennett, and *For Us a Child is Born* by Johann Sebastian Bach. Ragtime Pianist, Bob Milne, presented our 2nd concert, January 17, and entertained the audience with pianistic renditions and interesting facts about the musical compositions he played. The third concert in the series is *Trio Caminos*, who will present a varied and colorful program of classical guitar solos, duets and trios on February 14. Attending this concert would be a great way to celebrate Valentine's Day with that special someone. The members of this group are David Grimes, Gregory Newton and Michael Nigro. Mr. Grimes was Director of Guitar Studies at California State University, Fullerton, where he developed one of the nation's leading centers of guitar instruction. For eighteen years, Mr. Grimes was President of the Guitar Foundation of America and now remains as Reviews Editor for the journal *Soundboard*. Dr. Newton is on the faculties of Los Angeles City College, Los Angeles Valley College and Glendale College, teaching guitar, music theory and music appreciation. He is president of the American Guitar Society and director of the AGS International Concert Series. Mr. Nigro directs the guitar program at Vanguard University where he has established a comprehensive curriculum that includes Guitar Literature, Pedagogy, Fretboard Techniques and Guitar Ensemble. He is also co-author of *The Essential Classical Guitar Scale Book*. You are encouraged to come and hear these nationally and internationally acclaimed musicians perform.

For the fourth concert in our 2015–2016 season, we are pleased to have *Bel Canto Singers* back with us to present their annual concert on March 6, 2016, at 3:30 p.m. This year they will be singing a program of love songs. You are encouraged to attend and bring a friend as you enjoy *Matters of the Heart*.

The last concert for this season will be ***The Seven Last Words of Christ***, written by Theodore Dubois and presented by the Chancel Choir with orchestra on March 20, 2016, at 7 p.m. This work contains the last seven expressions of Jesus Christ. This powerful portrayal reminds us that Jesus was tortured and that he died on the cross to redeem mankind because of his love for us. 






Laura Berg, Minister of Congregational Care recommends *Help, Thanks, Wow: The Three Essential Prayers* by Anne Lamott.

If you can think of a project you have at home (i.e., mowing the yard, painting, pulling weeds, babysitting, cleaning, etc.), then you can hire out one of Coronado's finest and very hard working teens. All you have to do is fill out **ALL** the information on a "Description Form" found in the Church Ministries Office and turn it into Emily Edwards. Serve & Learn Mission Trip to Koinonia Farm

April 5-9, 2016

This will be an opportunity to serve with Koinonia Farm's Travelers' Ministry which provides some basic items of clothing (according to ICE regulations) to men scheduled for deportation who are detained at the Stewart Detention Center in Lumpkin, GA. Koinonia also assists with family visitation in concert with several "hospitality houses" in the area. The Koinonians have been involved in immigration issues and prison ministry for many years, and we can expect to learn from them in order to be of service closer to home here in Florida. This mission trip will be limited to 8 persons, with the hope of offering it again in the future.

Other opportunities, in addition to packing and delivering the requested bags for the detention center:

- 1) Visit with a detainee. This must be arranged in advance, and a visit request must come from a detainee.
- 2) View documentary film, *Briars in the Cotton Patch*, and learn about the history of this intentional Christian community that has been committed to racial equality since its founding in 1942.
- 3) Visit Habitat International Global Village in nearby Americus.
- 4) Visit Andersonville National Historic Site.
- 5) Visit the Albany Civil Rights Institute and hear the gospel choir that performs on the 2nd Saturday each month.
- 6) Help around the farm as needed.

A short morning devotion takes place at 7:50 each morning in the chapel. Pause for prayer takes place several times throughout the day.

Cost for room (double occupancy) for 4 nights, 3 community lunches, 4 community dinners, gas contribution, admission to Habitat Global Village and admission to the Albany Civil Rights Institute will be \$200 per person.

February 14 is celebrated as Boy Scout Sunday. On December 27, Rev. Peter Cottrell awarded Michael and Matthew Tarr their Medals for completing the *God and Me* and *God and Family* Programs in the Boy Scouts of America P.R.A.Y. Series. They are the sons of Carrie and Craig Tarr. Michael is in Cub Scouts and Matthew recently "Crossed Over" from Cubs to Boy Scouts. Their parents are active in the Three Rivers District of the Central Florida Council of Boy Scouts. They were joined by their sister and grandparents in this special presentation.

Community Hot Meals Program

The Community Hot Meal Program is a non-denominational, nonprofit organization under the auspices of the First United Methodist Church of New Smyrna Beach. We have 21 cooking teams and are supported by twenty local churches. These teams provide a hot meal to any person who presents themselves at our two locations.

Meals are served on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at Hollister Hall of First United Methodist Church, 11:30 a.m.-12:45 p.m. On Sunday evenings from 5-6 p.m., a meal is served in the Fellowship Hall of Edgewater United Methodist Church. The individual cooking teams prepare a nutritious, well-balanced and appealing meal. The meals are provided without regard to religious affiliation, race, gender, or economic circumstance. Only approximately 20% of our guests are considered homeless; many are stretching welfare, disability, or Social Security checks.

In 2015, 21,290 meals were served and over 200 volunteers gave 10,768 volunteer hours. Meals are even provided on all holidays. For the third year, we have provided a meal on Christmas Day for 230 people. Santa Claus visited bringing gifts for children and adults alike. Special fundraisers were held to pay for gifts and special Christmas treats.

Although the Community Hot Meal Program does not administer other help programs, they do provide space on Wednesdays to other agencies who provide clothing and health product distribution, recovery support groups, and resources for other types of assistance. During 2015, the Salvation Army representative was able to place 4 homeless veterans in housing.

Funding for the Program comes from participating churches, grants, fund raisers and the general public. No monies are diverted in support of the administration of the Program. Our only paid person is the custodian. Coronado Community United Methodist Church has two cooking teams serving on the second Monday and the third Wednesday of each month. Team captains are Bobbi Wilson (Monday Team) and Joan Harvey (Wednesday Team). Each team has rotating Cooking Leaders who plan and coordinate the meal each month.
