On January 7, a group of 10 missionaries met at Coronado Community United Methodist Church to leave for service at *Salud y Paz* in Guatemala. Reverend Laura Berg offered a special blessing before we left. Our travel was uneventful; we arrived in Guatemala City that afternoon. We were met by Jose, our group leader from *Salud y Paz*, who facilitated our travel to Chichicastenango. There we experi-



enced the huge open market on Sunday. Some were overwhelmed at the size of the market and the masses of people in attendance. Guatemalans come from all over the country to shop or present wares at this market. After the market closed we attended a church service, where we stood on stage to sing one of our familiar hymns. For many of us this was outside our comfort zone; but God touched us with the cour-

age to perform.

We then spent the week at *Salud y Paz*, Comanchaj, painting the school and furniture, repairing screens, and counting and labeling medications for medical teams to take the countryside. Our work was about relationship - ours at being able to serve and the Guatemalans at our caring enough to be there. They say our caring and ongoing presence offers hope. Whenever we distributed shoes or other donations, we were aware that the "Church had Left the Building," as we were acting as the hands and feet of our congregation under God's direction.



For some us, there was joy in returning to familiar faces; for others, it was a new experience with both apprehension and excitement to see what would happen. Since some of us sponsor students, being able to meet them in person and seeing how they have grown was a highlight. At the end of the week, during an orientation assembly, the team distributed backpacks we brought, giving us the opportunity to connect on a personal level with the students.

## Shrove Tuesday, February 28:

### Pancake Dinner, 5 p.m.

Shrove Tuesday (or *Mardi Gras*) occurs the first Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. It officially ends the season of **Epiphany** and is the vigil for the starting of Lent. Traditionally viewed as a day of repentance, Shrove Tuesday has become the last day for celebration and feasting before the period of fasting required during the Lenten season. The name "Shrove Tuesday" is derived from the word "shrive", which means to confess and receive absolution. The name denotes a period of cleansing, wherein a person brings their lusts and appetites under subjection through abstinence and self-sacrifice. Shrove Tuesday originated during the Middle Ages. Food items like meats, fats, eggs, milk, and fish were regarded as restricted during Lent. To keep such food from being wasted, many families would have big feasts on Shrove Tuesday in order to consume those items that would inevitably become spoiled during the next forty days. The English tradition of eating pancakes on Shrove Tuesday came about as a way to use as much milk, fats, and eggs as possible before Ash Wednesday began. In France, the consumption of all fats and fatty foods on this day coined the name "Fat Tuesday" or *Mardi Gras*.

## Ash Wednesday, March 1:

### Service with Communion, 6:30 p.m.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent and derives its name from the practice of blessing ashes and placing them on the foreheads of participants. Ash Wednesday emphasizes two themes: our sinfulness before God and our human mortality. The service focuses on both themes, helping us to realize that both have been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

by Dietrich Bonhoeffer



At the clinic, Lorena, a young lady we see each year, is only a year away from completing her nurse's training, thanks to scholarships from Coronado church members. Her brother, Jeff, will finish high school and plans to become a school teacher; and their sister, Jennifer, has received ongoing medication for a seizure disorder allowing her to participate fully in life. They invited the team to their home in Comanchaj. Their gracious mother welcomed us showing us how she weaves the colorful cloth we see throughout Guatemala. She was grateful for our ongoing presence and thanked us for helping her chil-

dren. It was an exceptional experience that swelled our hearts and moistened our eyes,



## Mission Trip to Cuba Planned for May

A team from Coronado will visit our sister churches in *Las Tunas* Province, Cuba, during the first week of May. We are in a covenant relationship with seven churches in the area around *Puerto Padre* and also support other fulltime pastors and missionary pastors in *Las Tunas*. Please keep the team in your prayers as they prepare for the visit.

I was raised in segregated Savannah, Georgia, in the 1940s and 1950s. My great-great grandfather and his brother owned and traded in slaves in middle Georgia. As teenagers, we boys called each other “queers” and used the N-word in immature, teenaged arguments. But today, my family includes young black men whom I love, and many of my close friends are in the local LGBTQ community. What happened in my life to make these changes in attitudes, not just possible, but essential to me?

In 1994, I was faced with life changes that seemed impossible. My friend, Wayne, was struggling with many of the same issues I faced. We supported each other through these difficult days; and, in the next couple of months, we bonded in a way that was special and powerful. Then I was stunned to learn that Wayne was gay . . . . A few years later, Eugene, a New Smyrna Beach black man about my age listened to my confession of wrongs I committed during the desegregation of Savannah’s schools and churches in the 1960s. A few weeks later, Eugene was able to tell me of events from this same time that he had never been able to discuss. Gene and I became close friends and saw each other regularly until cancer took his life in 2012. My love for Wayne and Gene changed me.

Last year I joined the Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN) of the United Methodist Church. I am a lay member of the Florida Steering Committee of RMN. My hope is to see changes in our national United Methodist Church so that LGBTQ pastors and members are able to fully participate in our Church.

I’ve been happy to hear Pastor Peter’s January sermons on Justice. By sharing my experiences with you in the Newsletter, I hope to stimulate discussions among our Coronado members about these LGBTQ justice issues. I would like to meet informally with small groups of our Church members. I hope those who favor change, those opposed, and those who are unsure will respond. ## Parking



We are pleased to have so many people join us in worship and for other programs. Our challenge continues to be having enough parking for everyone, particularly at the 9:30 a.m. services. We are working at making the situation better for all with newly painted

parking curbs and improved entrances to our main parking lot. As work is being completed, please be patient with the crews and with each other.

Parking is available in the front of the church in the concrete parking lot. On Sundays this area is reserved for drivers with disabled parking permits. The only ex-

ceptions are the loading/unloading area near the church kitchen and the spot reserved for the church bus.

Additionally, these areas are available: the dirt and gravel lot across the street adjacent to the Boutique; the paved area between Cedar Avenue and Columbus Ave in front of the Tree House; a cleared space on Cedar Avenue and the end of the Tree House and the lot adjacent to it. The public parking lot often has spaces available, and there are a few spots in front of Columbus House and in the rear of the Hospitality House. Please park a reasonable distance from the car next to you so a maximum number of cars can park.

We appreciate your support and understanding as we work to find solutions to these challenges.
