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
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Pentecost Is An Ongoing Gift

The Day of Pentecost marks the shift in the Church Calendar from God's Story to Our Story. And the Spirit reveals what needs to change in us, and brings God's healing and transforming grace into our lives. What an amazing gift this is!






Mike Williams Chosen Director of Music Ministries

We are delighted to announce that Mike Williams, our 11 a.m. Music Director, has been hired as our new Director of Music Ministries. Mike has been working as an independent contractor directing our 11 a.m. musicians and vocalists for five years; and we are very happy to see him assume this new role as a full time staff member. He will be directing all three services, starting in his position on June 1st.

A search committee was formed to identify and hire this position, a tough slot to fill after the wonderful work and dedication of Anita Wimbish. The committee consisted of Senior Pastor Peter Cottrell, Chair of Staff-Parish Relations Committee Rod Rich, our former Director of Music Ministries Anita Wimbish, our Accompanist/Organist Alice Nieburger, and Church Administrator Nancy Watts-Vanderbunt. Important qualifications were appropriate education and training, previous experience working in a church environment, proven skills and experience directing musical groups of varying ages, sizes and musical abilities, proven talent in voice and musical instrument, experience with and appreciation for varying styles of music and, most importantly, someone who would build on the great work already done by Anita and bring a style compatible with the culture of our Church and the needs of our music ministry. Clearly administrative skills, ability to organize events, participation in worship planning and other skills also are required.



We were fortunate to have a number of very talented musicians who we interviewed by phone and in person; and we watched performance tapes for some. After narrowing the field, Mike was the stand out choice of the committee.

Some things you might not know about Mike:

- ◆ He graduated from FSU *magna cum laude* with a Bachelor's degree in Music Education and has been sharing a love of music and the Lord throughout a very successful career.
- ◆ He has taught both middle school and high school.
- ◆ He is an accomplished musician who has performed with a wide variety of groups from high school and college marching bands to symphony orchestras, wind ensembles and musical theater. Like his father before him and son following him, he is well known for his talent on the French horn.
- ◆ He also served at First United Methodist of Port Orange as the Director of Music for 17 years. His experience there included directing Chancel Choirs for two traditional services, praise musicians for the contemporary service, children's choirs, hand bell choirs, music camps, Advent and Lent programs, concerts and cantatas . . . and the list goes on.

The honors received, awards won and professional recognitions achieved are too many to capture here.

We hope you are as excited as we are to welcome Mike Williams as a full-time member of our staff. We are blessed!

The Florida Conference met in its annual session in Orlando, June 7-11, with a theme of "Revive Us Again." Pastors Peter Cottrell and Laura Berg, Rev. Joyce Alexander, and Jeanne Hencken, Lay Delegate, represented Coronado at all sessions. Others attended various events and sessions. The Conference began with workshops, continued with plenary sessions, worship services, and ordination.

Bishop Ricardo Pereira, Cuba Methodist Church, was the special guest and delivered a powerful message on Friday evening about the need for revival within the church. He was the leader of a workshop on strengthening our connections with Cuba. Jeanne Hencken and Martha Ross, leaders of the recent mission trip to Cuba, attended and learned a great deal about better ways we can work with our sister churches. On

Thursday evening, a dinner was held celebrating the 20th Anniversary of the Cuba-Florida Covenant (now known as Methodists United in Prayer).





Coronado Left the Building and Went to Cuba

For a week in early May, seven members of Coronado, Rev. Peter Cottrell, Jeanne Hencken, Martha Ross, Ruth Baker, Claire Phillips, Carol Quick and Fran Spicer and the trip facilitator, Robert Pinera, who has spoken here, visited the area of *Puerto Padre, Las Tunas, Cuba*, where we have a sister church relationship with eight Methodist churches as part of Methodists United in Prayer.



Peter delivered the sermon during spirit-filled services. During the week the team had the opportunity to live and travel (ask about the bus and van rides from Havana) as Cubans and appreciate their indomitable spirit as they struggle with shortages of things we take for granted, "make do or do without," and find joy in their life and faith.

Thanks to your generosity, the team carried 1400 pounds of donated items in our checked luggage including everything from over-the-counter drugs to crowbars! The team carried 8 donated laptops for pastors and 8 cell phones. What a sight it was to see all of these bags piled on top of the van as it left the airport. Peter was responsible for everything being stowed safely on top. The joy the gifts brought to the congregations was very moving.

All of the team were blessed beyond measure from their interactions with our brothers and sisters in Cuba. They consider themselves part of Coronado and keep us in their daily prayers.

Some members of the team have shared their impressions of the trip.

Fran Spicer:

Cuba, I remember small churches, joyful singing and warm hugs. Our visits to the churches was all a part of a wonderful adventure. I felt truly blessed. We did bring gifts for the ministers and churches, if you can call Laptops and phones, gifts, but most of all we brought ourselves; and I think that meant more to the people we met even though we lacked the communication skills. I left with a deeper understanding of all that CCUMC does for those congregations. I am only a Snow Bird but you, as a congregation are helping those churches grow in very important ways. I know we will continue that support and treasure the opportunities it offers them, like water for their fields so they can grow food for themselves and other congregations. Alleluia.

Ruth Baker:

What a blessed adventure I had traveling to Cuba. We were eight people on a mission to visit eight churches. I feel so close to my travel companions, especially my roommate, Martha. What a bond you can form in just eight days. We were able to give each church a laptop and cell phone plus shoes, over the counter drugs like aspirin, Pepto-Bismol, tooth paste and tooth brushes, construction tools like hammers, saws and screw drivers. Each church was so thankful. Tears poured down their cheeks with thanks and gratitude. I especially remember the uplifting Latin music in each church. The Holy Spirit was definitely present as everyone clapped to the beat of the music. I was moved by Pastor Peter's sermon each time he told his story. I truly felt the grace of God. The only thing I would do different on my next trip to Cuba is carry a toilet seat.

Hyperthermia: Too Hot for Your Health

Since we in Florida have entered the hot and muggy time of year, I thought some refresher information on heat safety is in order. This is taken from an AgePage of the National Institute on Aging; and I am ordering some to make available in the carousel next to the Health Ministry Bulletin Board.



Being too hot for too long can cause several illness, all under the term **Hyperthermia**:

- ◆ Heat syncope is sudden dizziness that happens when you are active in hot weather. If you take a heart medication called a beta blocker you are more likely to feel faint. Rest in a cool place, put your legs up, and drink water.
- ◆ Heat cramps can occur in stomach, arms or legs usually from hard work or exercise. Your skin may feel cool and moist. Rest in a cool place and drink plenty of fluids but no alcohol or caffeine.
- ◆ Heat exhaustion is a warning that your body can no longer keep itself cool. You may feel thirsty, dizzy, weak, uncoordinated, nauseated, sweat a lot, skin may feel cool and clammy, and may have a rapid pulse. Rest in a cool place and drink plenty of fluids. If you don't feel better soon, get medical help.
- ◆ Heat Stroke-this is a medical emergency! You need medical care immediately! Signs are: fainting; change in behavior; body temperature over 104 degrees F; dry, flushed skin and strong, rapid pulse; or a slow, weak pulse and not sweating.

You can lower your risk of heat illnesses by drinking plenty of fluids such as water or fruit or vegetable juices not containing alcohol or caffeine. Dress in cooler clothing such as cotton. Don't exercise outside or do other activities outside when it is hot, or during the hottest part of the day, 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Stay cool and be safe.






Pray for our Youth Costa Rica Mission Team that will be ministering to children and families in San Ramon, Costa Rica, June 10-18. Every year our students work very hard to participate in an international mission project with Pura Vida Missions. This year students who wanted to participate in our youth mission projects had to fulfill many requirements to be eligible to attend. Each student completed an application outlining their interest in the project, special skills they can contribute to the team, and a reflection on what they hope to gain from the experience. Each youth also is required to participate in all team fundraisers (2 excused absences), complete at least two individual fundraisers, and complete at least one service project. Students also must attend team training meetings and prepare spiritually by attending church and/or youth group and completing a personal devotional time consistently. Whatever money is not raised for our team, the student's families will pay out of pocket to make this experience happen for our young people.
