
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Remembering Who We Are: Where Covenant, Justice and Unity Meet

This fall I have used a simple drawing of three circles to portray something of where we are as a church in the present moment. The three circles are: **covenant**, **justice** and **unity**.



Covenantal people greatly value the promises we have made to God and to each other in baptism, in ordination and in consecration. They seek greater public accountability when our covenants are broken.

Those in a search for *justice* participate in a history that gives greater rights and offers God’s grace and blessings to more people. This history includes the abolition of slavery, the recognition of women in ministry and now the inclusion of the LGBTQ community in the full life of the church.

Those who value *unity* have the conviction that covenantal people and justice seekers can live together in the church. They do not see the present LGBTQ conversation as a church-dividing issue; and they live in the tension, often at the congregational level, amidst differences that reflect the beauty and complexity of the one body.

My own calling is to seek to *expand* or *grow* the space where these three circles *overlap*. I share passions of justice, covenant and unity with friends across my own annual conference and the global church. The shared space where justice, covenant and unity overlap is *not* a mushy middle! It is the complex place where many faithful people live.

The Vision of the **Commission on a Way Forward** is to “*design a way for being church that maximizes the presence of a United Methodist witness in as many places in the world as possible, that allows for as much contextual differentiation as possible, and that balances an approach to different theological understandings of human sexuality with a desire for as much unity as possible.*”

I understand this to be the generative work of our denomination in this present moment.

***Living Faithfully: Human Sexuality
and the United Methodist Church***
Thursdays, November 2, 9, 16, and 30
6:30–8 p.m. (4 sessions)

There is deep disagreement about what The United Methodist Church should teach about homosexuality, same gender marriage, and the ordination of LGBTQ persons. In 2019, a special session of General Conference will be held to consider these issues and how they will be addressed by The United Methodist Church in the future.

Living Faithfully: Human Sexuality and The United Methodist Church by authors Jill M. Johnson, Dave Barnhart, Rebekah Jordan Gienapp, and Alex Joyner, is designed to help you understand the shape of this debate and what it means for the present and the future. Each chapter includes background on the Bible, Christian theology, history, stories from diverse viewpoints, and United Methodist structure and practice to guide reflection and conversation. You'll also find definitions of key terms and information about upcoming events.

The four chapters are:

1. *Is the Practice of Homosexuality Incompatible with Christian Teaching?*
2. *Is Same-gender Marriage Compatible with Christian Teaching?*
3. *Is Ordaining Practicing Homosexuals Compatible with Christian Teaching?*
4. *Where Are We Now?*

This four-week study will help you understand and grapple with various views about the ministry and teaching of The United Methodist Church around issues of human sexuality. This study will help you to have honest, well-informed, and grace-filled conversations with others about these matters and the calls for change. And it will help you discern, in prayer and conversation, how you can respond faithfully to the love of God and neighbor.


Introduction to John:



In his *Recapturing the Wesleys' Vision*, Paul Chilcote describes our tradition as a “place” that is not “either/or” but “both/and.”

“The Wesleyan method”, he writes, “can be called *conjunctive* because it seeks to join things together, rather than permitting them to be pulled apart” (16). And, so he speaks of faith and works, personal and social, heart and head, Christ and culture, piety and mercy.

Look again at the visual image of the three overlapping circles. Picture a person, a follower of Jesus, whom you might associate with one of the circles. Now think of a different person in a different circle. And another. This is The United Methodist Church in its most local and global expression. At our best we are connected to each other for a purpose: to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. This mission includes keeping covenant, loving justice and seeking unity. And it is about growing, expanding, and honoring the space where these three values can be joined together.

ALL SAINTS DAY

November 1 is All Saints Day, a sometimes-overlooked holy day in United Methodist congregations. It is not nearly as well known as the day before, All Hallows' (Saints') Eve, better known as Halloween, but is far more important in the life of the church. All Saints Day is an opportunity to give thanks for all those who have gone before us in the faith. It is a time to celebrate our history, what United Methodists call the tradition of the church.

From the early days of Christianity, there is a sense that the Church consists of not only all living believers, but also all who have gone before us. For example, in Hebrews 12 the author encourages Christians to remember that a “great cloud of witnesses” surrounds us encouraging us, cheering us on.

On Sunday, November 5, we shall celebrate All Saints Day by remembering aloud in worship the names of all those in our church fellowship who have died since November 1, 2016. We shall also tie colorful ribbons on a wreath in the Narthex to remember all of those who have gone before us at any time. They truly are our “cloud of witnesses.”


the winter months.





We hope to grow our music ministry at Coronado. Here are some opportunities for you to serve:

The **Adult Chancel Choir** provides music for the Sunday morning 9:30 a.m. Traditional Worship Service and for special seasonal programs. They rehearse on Wednesday evenings at 7 p.m. We are always excited for new singers to join us, especially men; and we hope you will consider singing with us. You can contact me or just walk in and surprise us. We will welcome you with open arms!

We are rehearsing now for our Christmas Cantata, “*Sing Joy to All the World!*” It will be presented on Sunday, December 10, at 7 p.m. in the Sanctuary. The overriding theme of this inspiring Christmas work by Lloyd Larson is joy. It celebrates the promise that joy comes to those who wait, that following the long dark night, the breaking of dawn brings joy for the new day. The music incorporates original melodies with familiar carols in a work that ranges from contemplative to celebratory.



The choir is also rehearsing for “*The Longest Night,*” a winter service for hope and healing. This will be a unique service of devotion that has a very special ministry focus. This introspective work is intended to be a worship experience that encourages those going through times of sorrow and grief during the holidays. Inspired by the solstice, winter’s longest night, this service of music, scripture and prayer will seek to bring light into the darkness and offer hope to those in deepest need. The service will be on Thursday, December 21, at 6 p.m. in the Sanctuary.

If you would like to sing with us for the cantata, rehearsals for this music are on Wednesday nights from 7:40-8:10 p.m. If you would like to sing with us for the Longest Night Service, rehearsals for that music will be on Wednesday nights from 8:10-8:30 p.m. You do not have to be a choir member to sing with us for these presentations. An orchestra will join us for both programs. Church members who are able to help contribute to the cost for these musicians can do so in memory or in honor of a friend or loved one. Contact me (386-428-6252, ext. 119) for further information.

Joyful Sound, is a group of women and men who will usually sing on the fourth Sunday of each month from November through April for the 8 a.m. Traditional Worship Service. They sing the anthem which the Chancel Choir will sing at the 9:30 a.m. Traditional Worship Service. If you would like to sing with this group, you could come to two rehearsals on the Wednesday nights before they sing on the fourth Sunday. The time is from 7:15-7:40 pm. The first rehearsal you would come to is on November 15th.

REFLECTIONS is a women’s vocal ensemble. They will usually sing on the third Sunday of the month from November through April for the Sunday morning 8 a.m. Traditional Worship Service and occasionally for the 9:30 a.m. Traditional Worship Service. All women are welcome to be a part of this group. They will rehearse two Wednesdays and then be off for two Wednesdays. Their first rehearsal is on November 8th, from 6:30-7 p.m.

BAND OF BROTHERS is a men's vocal ensemble. They will usually sing on the first Sunday of the month from November through April for the Sunday morning 8 a.m. Traditional Worship Service and occasionally for the 9:30 a.m. Traditional Worship Service. All men are welcome to be a part of this group as well. They will rehearse two Wednesdays and then be off for two Wednesdays. They began rehearsing on October 25th and will meet again on November 1st before singing on November 5th. They will rehearse again on November 21st and November 29th from 6:30-7 p.m.

The **11 a.m. Music Team** provides music for the Sunday morning 11 a.m. Non-Traditional Worship Service. This is a praise and worship style of music. The team rehearses on Thursday evenings. Instrumentalists arrive at 6:45 p.m., and vocalists arrive at 7:15 p.m. Rehearsals are until 8:30 p.m. If you sing or play **any** instrument and enjoy this style of music, there is a place for you on this team. We would love for you to join us! Singers and instrumentalists in this group are generally scheduled on a rotation basis. If you think you might be interested, you can contact me, and **we will work to accommodate your schedule.**







Your Spiritual Growth Pyramid

We know that we need nutritious food to keep our bodies healthy. Remember the old food pyramid? We were supposed to eat from all the food groups in that pyramid to stay healthy. The same is true for our spiritual life . . . we need 'soul' food. We need a Spiritual Growth Pyramid.

1. **Foundation** – For all, our base should be “Be Still and Know that am God.” Psalm 46:10a. Get quiet, breathe and be aware of your breath. Spend some time to listen for God’s voice while walking in silence, while cleaning your house . . . the important thing is to take time to listen.
2. **Prayer** – Prayer lifts us up out of the chaos of the moment to a different reality. We need to create a holy and sacred space dedicated to prayer. But in addition, we should pray all through the day, in our car, while shopping, while waiting in line, anywhere. I personally enjoy early morning prayer time, before I start my day, the most.

4. **Creativity** – DO THINGS THAT MAKE YOUR HEART SING! Whatever that may be for you; have an activity that takes you out of yourself. Something that you get so involved in doing that you forget time and just enjoy the moment. That is so good for our souls.
5. **Self-Care** – Rest, exercise, eat good food, get a massage or a facial, take a power nap. It’s allowed! Also it’s perfectly fine to be in your jammies at 8 p.m. And learn how to set boundaries around your time, around yourself. ‘No’ is a complete sentence!
6. **Music** – I am not a musician. I don’t sing well; just ask anyone who sits near me at church. But I love music. I listen to it all day at home, and it transports me to a place of serenity.



If we do not take care of ourselves spiritually, we might not have a strong foundation upon which to help others. Let's not burn out by doing too much or by not taking care of ourselves. 

HEALTH TOPIC OF THE MONTH: Arthritis




The term “arthritis” literally means “joint inflammation” and actually refers to more than 100 rheumatic diseases. Rheumatic diseases are characterized by inflammation, degeneration and/or disruption of the connective tissue structures of the body, most commonly joints, muscles, bursae, tendons and fibrous tissue. People with rheumatic diseases experience pain, stiffness and/or limitation of motion in the affected structures.

Most rheumatic diseases are chronic, meaning they have no cure and long-lasting but can usually be managed with proper treatment. The most common diseases we are familiar with are Osteoarthritis and Rheumatoid Arthritis but there are many others.

Common symptoms include pain, stiffness, limitation of movement, sometimes swelling and redness of a joint, fatigue, weakness, all of which can lead to becoming less active, isolated, lonely, depressed, deconditioned, which lead to increased pain, stiffness, loss of function—a cycle called Chronic Disease Symptom Cycle. Breaking this cycle may involve medications, surgery, conservative methods such as physical therapy, ice, relaxation techniques and exercise appropriate for the individual. Arthritis treatment is individualized since people with arthritis have differences in symptoms and severity of disease in addition to type of disease. Most important is to follow recommendations of your health care provider in an attempt to maintain and achieve the best function possible for you.



History Is Made at Salud y Paz

PANAJACHEL, GUATEMALA –

“This isn’t just a successful day; this is an historic day for *Salud y Paz* and the people in the Guatemalan highlands.” That news was from the International Hands in Service (IHS) Board of Directors after representing *Salud y Paz* in their meeting with the seven pastors of the Executive Committee of the Guatemalan National Church (*Iglesia Evangélica Nacional Metodista Primitiva de Guatemala*, or IENMPG) on October 27.

The Board of Directors was in Panajachel for their Autumn meeting, seeking reconciliation and a renewed partnering with the National Church. The seven pastors of the Executive Committee traveled to Panajachel from around the country, and the two organizations were able to meet and share their goals and wishes.

Both organizations were thrilled to renew the partnership between them, and the result is a new 20-year agreement for the use of the IENMPG property where *Salud y Paz* operates medical, dental, and surgical clinics as well as the Susanna Wesley (children’s) School. The partnership also produced a Covenant of Shared Ministry that affirmed “the biblical call to practice justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with our God,” and noted that the two organizations will partner to work together to support each other, to collaborate regularly, and

to work in a manner that provides maximum benefit to the people being served.

IENMPG President Rev. Juan Ixtan said, “We are now brothers and sisters, and we have turned our focus to the future and to the physical and spiritual well-being of all of God’s children in Guatemala.”

“This is a watershed moment for *Salud y Paz* and for the Guatemalan people,” said *Salud y Paz* President and CCUMC member Arlen Stauffer. “The *Salud y Paz* future is very bright.”

Coronado has a long-standing relationship with *Salud y Paz*. We support them through our Missions Budget and also send mission teams each year.
