## 50 Years without King

Clara Ester was in the parking lot of the Lorraine Motel in Memphis on the day the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated. She was one of the many United Methodists leaders who walked with King while he was alive, and many more are inspired by his life today. April 4, 2018, marked 50 years since the Baptist preacher and civil rights giant was assassinated while in Memphis, where he had gone to support black sanitation workers striking for better working conditions.

Ester was a college student and a member of Centenary Methodist Episcopal Church, where the Rev. James Lawson was pastor. Lawson was one of King’s foot soldiers in the civil rights movement and had invited King to come to Memphis to speak to the sanitation workers and lead a march.

“Dr. King came into the city early - April 3, 1968 - and he met with ministers. It was thundering and lightning.” He was invited to speak at Mason Temple, Church of God in Christ, which would seat thousands, she said. She remembers King’s words that night: “If I had been given a choice of which century to be born in, it would be this one.” He said being born in his day allowed him, among other things, to be with the sanitation workers. He talked about the bomb threat of the plane that he came out on. He said, “I come into the city hearing about the threat on my life, but that doesn’t matter anymore because I’ve been to the mountain top, and God’s allowed me to see the Promised Land.... I may not get there with you, but we as a people will get to the Promised Land!” You could have heard a pin drop.



The next day Ester was pulling into the parking lot at the Lorraine Motel when she heard a blast “like a truck backfiring. It was gunshot. I saw Dr. King thrown up in the air and then back down, hitting the pavement. My friend Mary Hunter and I took off running up the stairs toward him. He was breathing but very slowly. I unbuckled his belt to help. His eyes were open. On the side of his head and neck was a pool of blood,” she writes.

That day marked her for life, she said. “Today, there’s no kind of injustice - gay rights, immigration rights, whatever - that I don’t feel obligated to address.”

Today Ester is vice president of the United Methodist Women’s board of directors. She retired in December 2006 as executive director of Dumas Wesley Community Center, a United Methodist Women-supported mission institution in Mobile, Alabama.



# Message from Peter

I have found great meaning in our small group Lenten study on Tuesday evenings engaging more deeply together, getting to know each other and exploring our own spiritual journey.

So thanks to J and J and A and W and J and T and M and P and L and B. (I am certain that I will think of more, so please forgive me for not listing everyone.)

There are places to serve if you are able: We are especially in need of Communion Preparers (right now being done by staff and worship leadership). Other volunteer opportunities arise on a regular basis; so call the office if you have some time to serve.

Lastly I want to mention that Emily Edwards will soon be on maternity leave. I mention this so that if you need her, you call the office rather than her personal cell phone. We want her to feel that we respect this special time of bonding; so you can send her gifts and cards, but all business calls should come to the office.

One last word - He is Risen. You are loved.




# News from Cuba

In March, we had a chance to hear from Rev. Alexis Fernandos Moreno, pastor of Iglesia Metodista 1, Puerto Padre, Cuba. Alexis is not the pastor of one of our sister churches, but he is a full elder in the *Iglesia Metodista* and also a teacher in the regional seminary. He acts as mentor to the younger pastors of our sister churches clustered in and around Puerto Padre and as host for our teams when they visit. The Mission Committee hosted him and Rev. Aldo Martin of the FLUMC at a dinner on Saturday evening which gave them an opportunity to learn of needs and good news from Cuba. On Sunday morning, Alexis gave a powerful message at each service in which he talked about the transformative power of the Holy Spirit in his own life and in the life of the Cuban church.

Our sister churches have sent Easter greetings and have told us of the ways they celebrate Easter. Some prepare for Easter with many days of fasting and prayer during Lent and, especially, Holy Week. Many of them present a Passion Play in their church.



## Water Purification Systems

Thanks to your generosity, we are well on our way to providing the water purification systems for our sister churches. You may contribute at any time. They will begin the manufacturing of them in June with the hope that a flight will be approved for later in 2018. This is such an exciting project which has now extended beyond Coronado. One of our regular winter visitors took the information back to his home church and friends in North Carolina, and we received a very generous donation from them. Another of our winter visitors took the information back to his home church in Ohio in hopes that they can participate, perhaps in another area of Cuba, as they have been looking for a mission project. There are over 350 Methodist churches in Cuba, and every one of them needs pure water for their people.

## Mission Trip May 23-31, 2018

A team from Coronado will visit with our eight sister churches and others with whom we are affiliated for a week in late May. Because our churches are “house churches” (the pastor’s home is also the church), the government rules are different than if we were in other places. We are not allowed to preach or teach but can be there to form and grow our personal relationships with the people. They tell us how much it means to them to know we are praying for them, and they pray for us every day. We can also take them items which they are unable to purchase there and/or cash with which to purchase expensive items. You can help by contributing some of these items.

**We are collecting the following in the Welcome Center and will add to our list as we go along:**

- \* **Over the counter medicines - unopened and unexpired - such as Alka Seltzer; antacids, antibiotics; aspirin, Aleve, Motrin, Tylenol, etc.; Benadryl; fish oil; Imodium; Poligrip; Preparation H; vitamins - adult/children**
- \* **Toothbrushes and toothpaste (unexpired)**
- \* **Brushes, combs, hair dryers (small), curling irons, straightening and styling irons - they would like to set up a beauty shop at church; manicure sets; nail polish**
- \* **New unlocked phones (BLU is an excellent choice) - there are still pastors and missionaries who do not have phones (last year we tried taking good used phones, and they did not work).**




## 2018 Mission Study

Please join us Saturday, April 14, for the 2018 UMW Mission Study on CUDAS UnHooked. Come hear Shawn Lane, Founding Chairman, talk about this extremely successful local mission for at-risk high school students. Coffee and snacks will be served in the Fellowship Hall at 9:30 a.m.; then we'll move into the Music-Lecture Suite at 10 a.m. for the presentation and discussion.

Did you know that our beautiful beach town has over 90 homeless teens? Since 2009, CUDAS UnHooked has led the effort to support at-risk and homeless teens in New Smyrna Beach, from mentoring to personal development to shelter so they can become educated, independent, contributing members of society.

CUDAS UnHooked developed the **4 Pillars of Success** to fit the needs of students who are dedicated to graduating:

- ♦ **Senior Life.** The last year of high school is not just filled with classes, but also the traditions and ceremonies that make high school years memorable. The Student Life program is designed to help those students in need with expenses such as Homecoming, Prom, Grad Bash, Yearbooks and Senior Dues. In addition, CUDAS UnHooked helps with transportation to doctor appointments, special school related events, and job interviews.
- ♦ **Personal Development.** CUDAS UnHooked members are offered personal development skills to meet some of the difficulties of life; such as, budgeting, job skills, and networking. Most importantly students are encouraged to think about their future and college.
- ♦ **Mentoring.** An important part of helping at-risk students successfully graduate from high school is offering assistance through the Mentoring Pillar component: volunteer tutoring and individual/group counseling. Mentoring volunteers are always welcome on campus and are permitted to check out copies of texts used by students. Guidance counselors are open to meeting with mentoring volunteers to discuss areas of concern. Meeting the emotional needs of CUDAS UnHooked students is an important component of the program. Weekly group counseling provides a model for problem solving and helps students learn how to access emotional support in a positive way. Individual counseling is also available.
- ♦ **CUDA House.** "A home where I can live as I cross the rough seas to the land of independence, becoming all I am meant to be." Our home offers students a place of safety and security through a supervised and structured environment. Students living at **The CUDA House** are able to focus on learning and graduating from high school. The generosity of the CUDAS UnHooked community teaches our young people that success includes service. Residents give back through community service as they become productive young adults, growing in both knowledge and integrity.

Shawn Lane is a 1988 CUDA graduate who earned a degree in business administration from the University of Central Florida. Shawn's career in sales and marketing has given him experience which he utilizes to help local charities. Shawn served in leadership roles throughout his life including philanthropies as founding Vice-Chairman of Kids aRe First, Chairman of NSB CAPS, and Founding Chairman of CUDAS UnHooked.
